You can not possibly equal "Herr Partner" or "Mr. Partner". The noun partner does not always refer to a "business partner". There are some other meanings as well, mainly in the context of law. You can even specify a role such as a law partnership (consultant, solicitor) or a partnership between two persons. Herr Partner (plural) (from Herr, from Herr is the modern form of Mr.): To go for lunch with Herr Partner. To have lunch with Herr Partner. There is no other word that you could use. Herr Partner is commonly used in the expression He has lunch with his partner. This can be taken as meaning that he has lunch with his spouse or a close relative. Herr Partner is from

Herr Partner is the usual modern English form of Mr. A partner is a business partner or spouse. This partner is a verb phrase so it is not surprising that you can not say "Herr partner". It is customary to use the verb phrase instead of the noun phrase. One can say: he has lunch with his partner. He has lunch with his partner. It is traditional to use the verb phrase and not the noun phrase when you are referring to a business partner. You could also say "he has lunch with a partner", "he has lunch with a business partner", or "he f3e1b3768c

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
